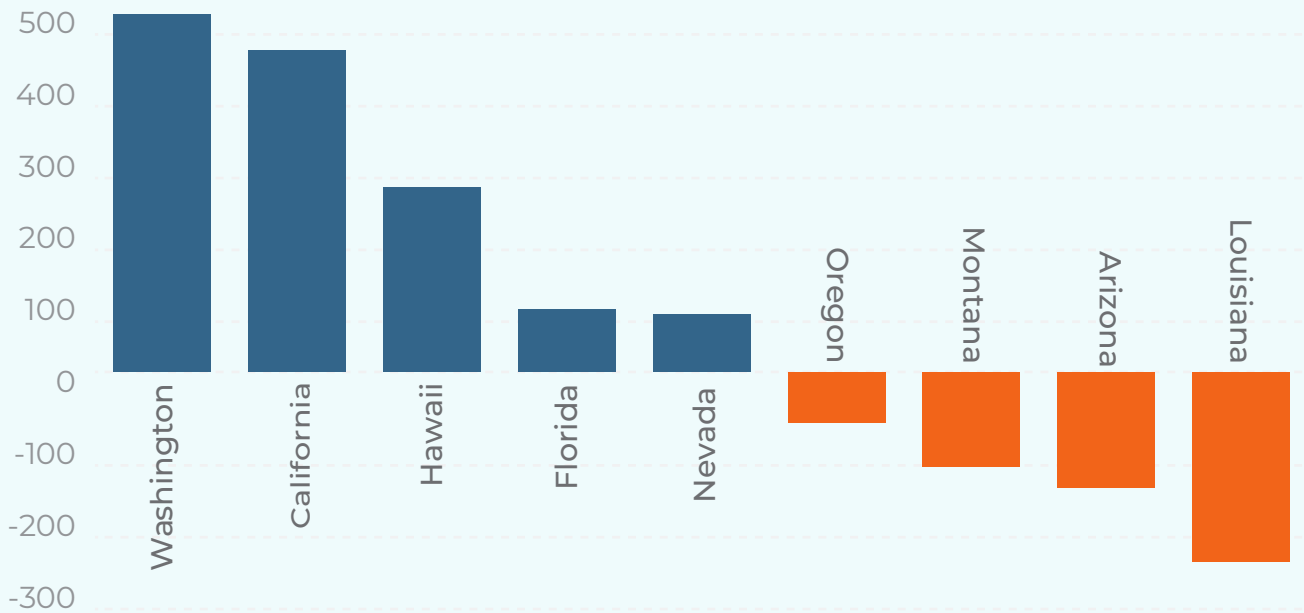

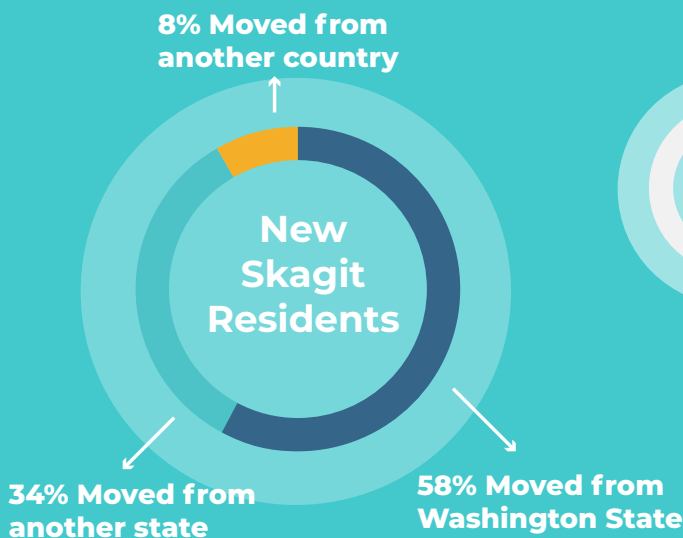
1,247 NEW PEOPLE

moved to Skagit County in a net population increase between 2011 and 2015.

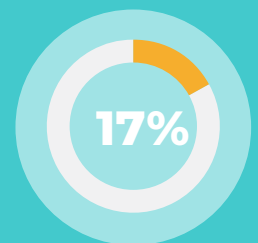
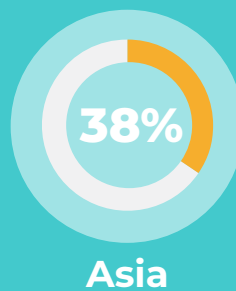

Strongest Net Migration of Residents to Skagit County by State



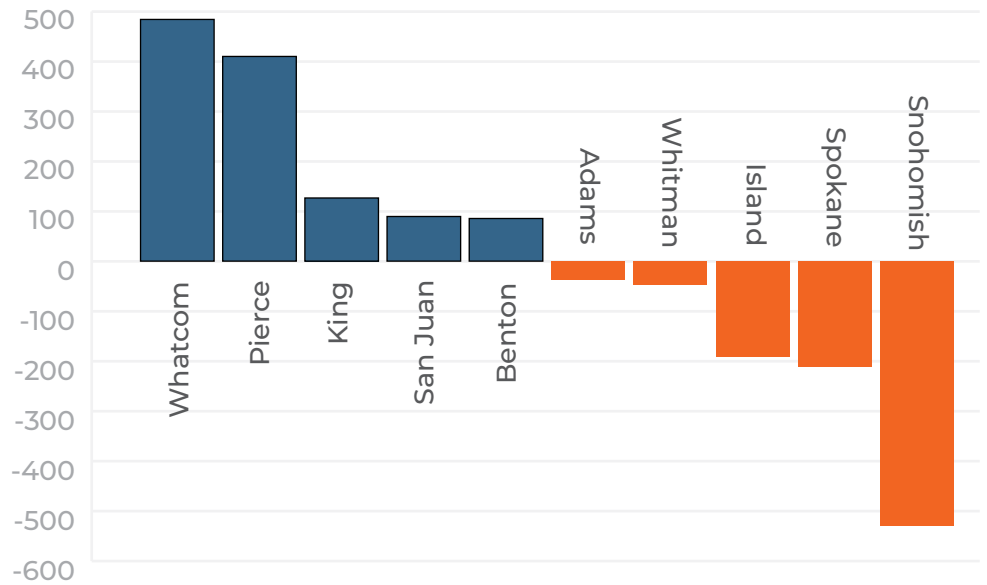
From Overseas: New International Residents by Continent

Most residents who moved to Skagit County moved from within Washington State.

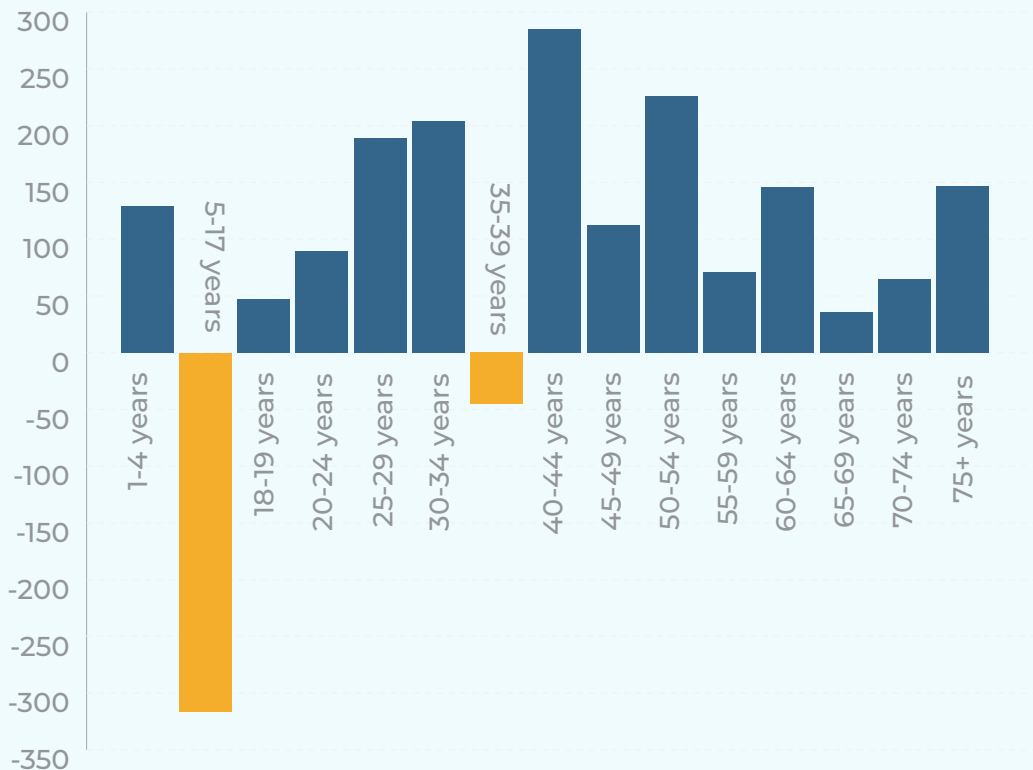

484 net residents moved to Skagit County from Whatcom

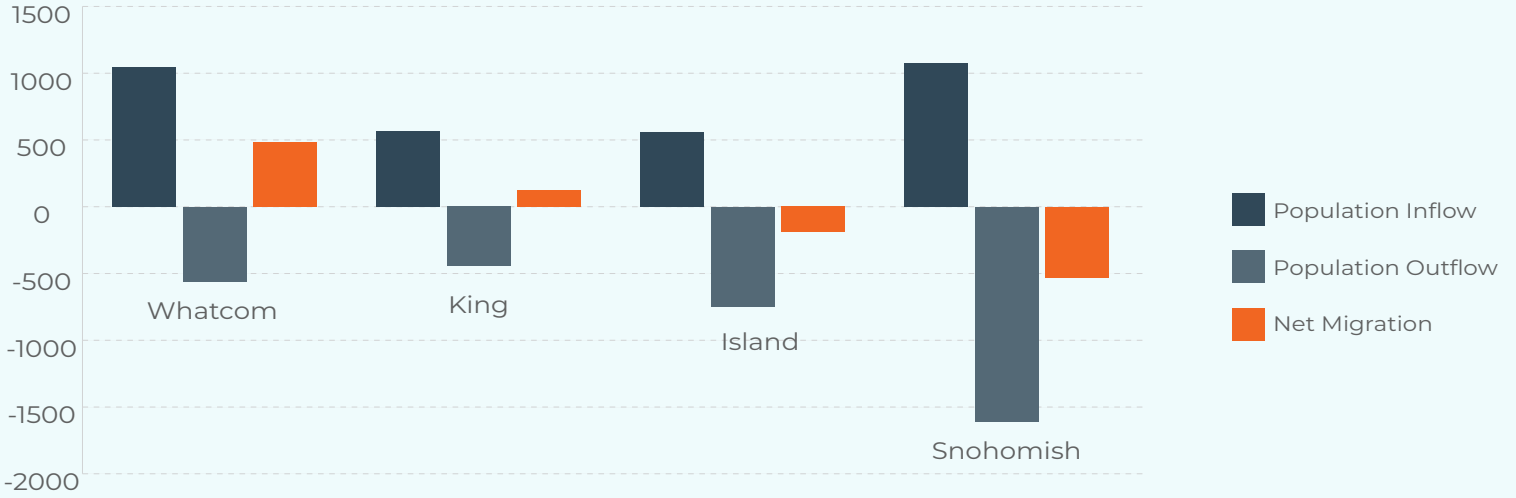
529 net residents moved from Skagit to Snohomish County

Age and Skagit County: Net Migration Flows By Individual Residents

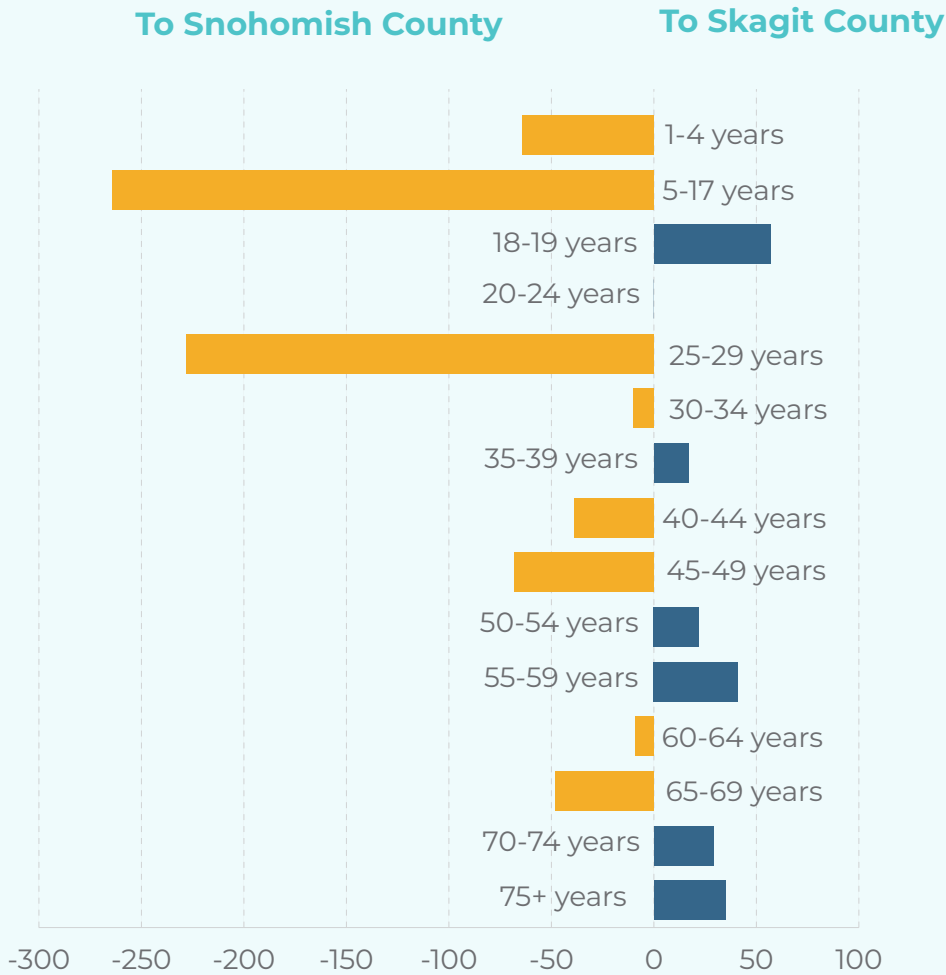

Population Flows between Neighboring Counties and Skagit County By Individual Residents

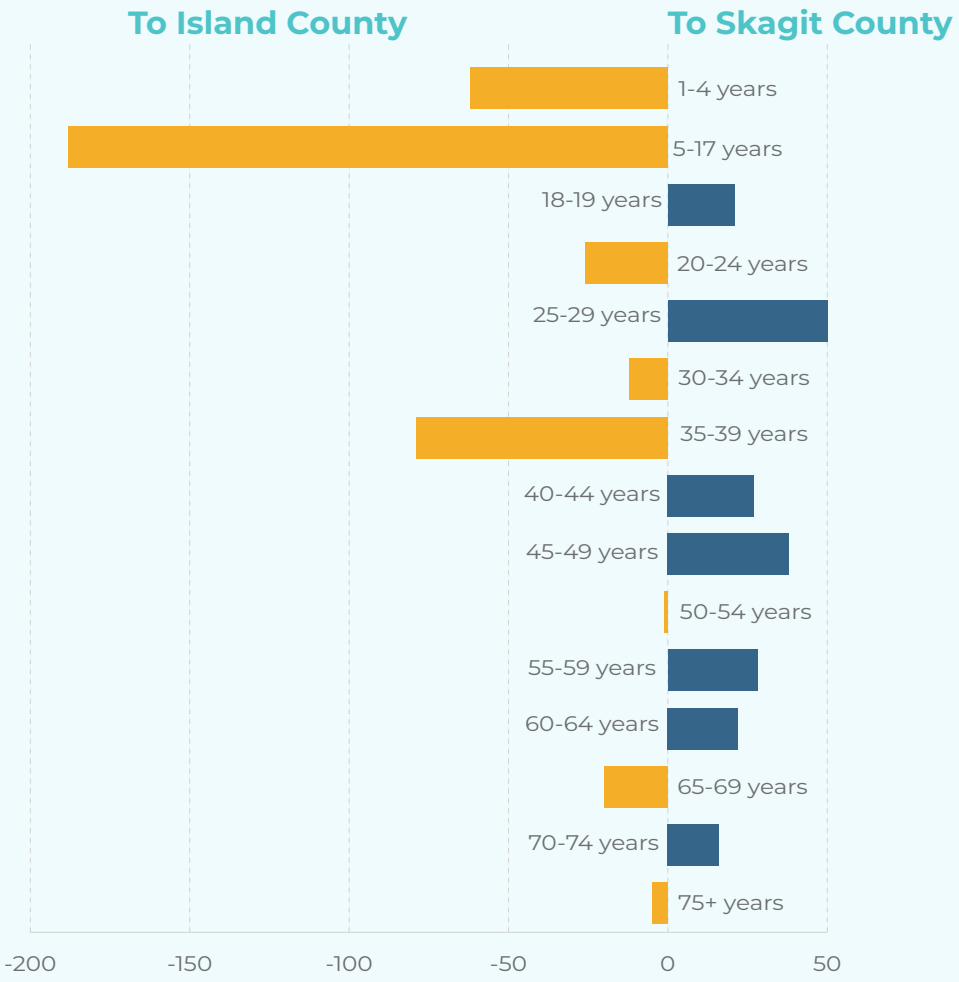


Snohomish ↔ Skagit Net Migration by Age Group By Individual Residents



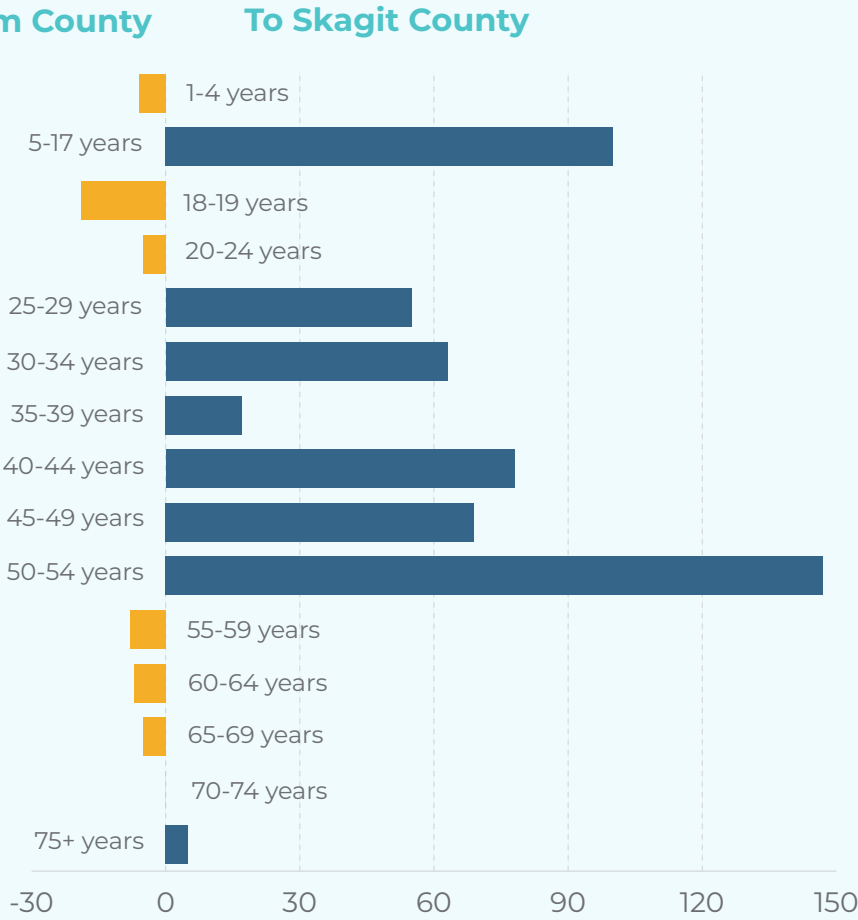
Island ↔ Skagit Net Migration by Age Group

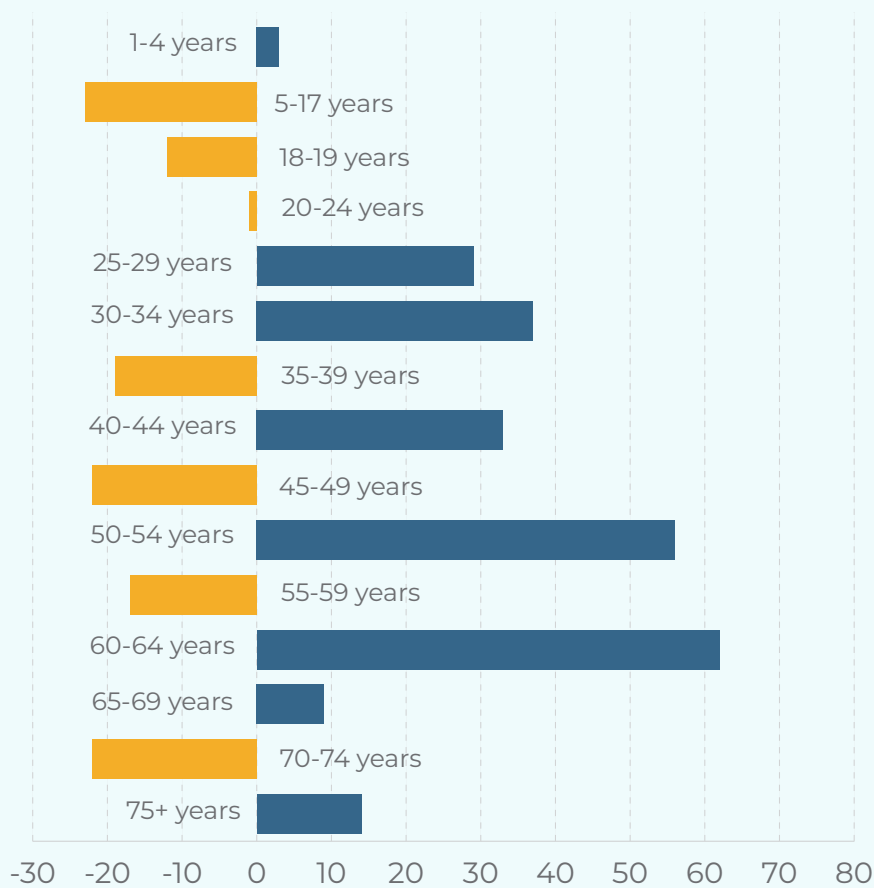
Whatcom ↔ Skagit Net Migration by Age Group

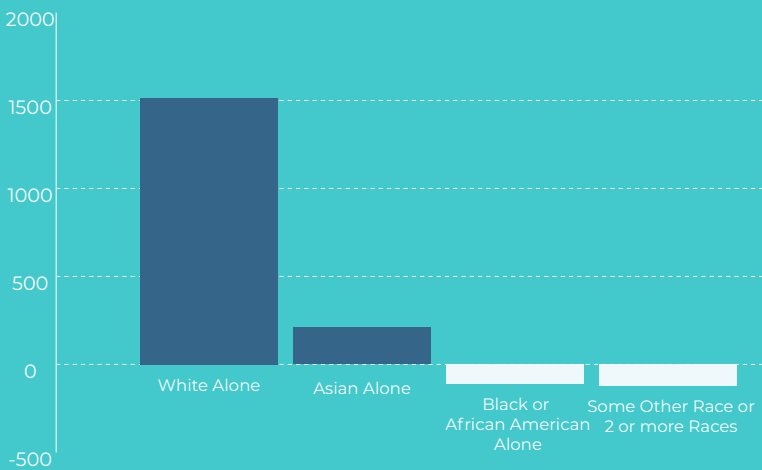
