



% Youth (<20) Population Regional Transportation 26.1% and over 0% to 19% Network






Low-Income Population, Skagit County: 2017-2021 Estimates

% Low-Income Population









% Black and African American







Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander Population, Skagit County: 2020

% Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander Population








% American Indian and Alaska Native Population







Hispanic and Latino Population, Skagit County: 2020







5. Planning – Describe the transportation planning activities performed this reporting period. Describe the actions taken to promote Title VI compliance regarding transportation planning, including monitoring and review processes, community involvement, their outcome or status. Include examples of community outreach.

- SCOG completed work on the 2025-2030 Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) in October, 2024. As part of the RTIP update, an Environmental Justice (EJ) analysis was conducted on fiscally constrained projects. The EJ analysis determined that transportation investments are not having a disproportionate adverse effect on EJ Census blocks and tracts. SCOG also held a public comment period prior to adoption of the RTIP that ran from September 19 through October 4, 2024, with notice posted on the SCOG website and in the Skagit Valley Herald. No public comments were received during the comment period.
- SCOG began work on the "Move Skagit" regional planning effort during the reporting period.
 "Move Skagit" is made up of three different plans, all being developed concurrently: The Skagit 2050 Regional Transportation Plan, the Skagit Regional Safety Action Plan, and the Transportation Resilience Improvement Plan. Major public outreach has been conducted as part of the "Move Skagit" planning process. This outreach included development of an ADA-compliant website with translation into Spanish language, in person outreach at events throughout Skagit County, and meetings with various stakeholders throughout the community.
- SCOG completed a prioritization process for human services transportation projects throughout the region in January 2025 in support of WSDOT's Consolidated Grant Program. This process was conducted with the assistance of SCOG's ad-hoc Special Needs transportation Committee. The Special Needs Transportation Committee is made up of various human services stakeholders from the region.
- 6. SCOG did not undertake any right-of-way actions, to include activities associated with the purchase, sale, lease/use, or transfer of real property during the reporting period.

SCOG conducted an EJ analysis of fiscally constrained projects as part of the <u>2025-2030 RTIP</u> update (pages 14-16). The EJ analysis used the recently created 2023 Skagit Demographic Profile and considered any Census block or tract within 100 feet of an RTIP project as being impacted. The EJ analysis determined that there are no disproportionate adverse effects on EJ Census blocks or tracts.

As part of the work done for the Skagit Regional Safety Action Plan, the consultants conducted a transportation equity review of the regional high injury network using the Washington Environmental Health Disparities (EHD) mapping tool. Major findings from the analysis are that equity communities within the Skagit region are disparately involved in Killed and Serious Injury (KSI) crashes throughout the region.

SCOG did not undertake any construction projects during the reporting period.

The SCOG Board of Directors met six times during the reporting period. Fifty-three members of the public attended SCOG Board of Directors meetings during the reporting period. The typical practice at SCOG is to distribute meeting packets for all public meetings and any other public events, such as open houses, at least seven days prior to the scheduled date. Meeting packets are delivered via email group lists, which include local news media, and are posted to SCOG's website. SCOG Board of Directors and Transportation Policy Board meetings are initially announced to the public in the calendar month preceding each meeting, with date and location provided.

During the reporting period, SCOG finished the process of creating a prioritized human services transportation project list for Skagit County. As part of this effort, an ad hoc special needs transportation committee, created in May 2024, provided advice during the project prioritization process. Per FTA requirements included in FTA Circular C 4702.1B, the committee was asked to provide self-identified racial and ethnic information. The results of this demographic information request are included in the following tables:

When establishing the committee, efforts were made to ensure that organizations serving were involved in some way with special needs transportation, including persons with low-income, the elderly, persons with disabilities, veterans and youth. The committee began meeting in June 2024 and held its last meeting in December 2024. More information on ad hoc committees, including racial and ethnicity statistics for Skagit County with a comparison to committee composition, can be found in the Title VI Plan.

During the reporting period, SCOG began work on three major plans as part of the "Move Skagit" planning effort. As part of public outreach for "Move Skagit", SCOG created a website that included the option to translate into Spanish and also created Spanish language factsheets for each plan.

11. Transportation-related Construction and Consultant Contracts (if applicable) – Briefly describe the process used to advertise and award construction contracts during this reporting period. Include the process for negotiated contracts (e.g., consultants).

During the reporting period SCOG issued one Request for Proposals (RFP) and one Request for Qualifications (RFQ) for professional services. The RFP was for professional services to develop a Transportation Resilience Improvement Plan, and the RFQ was for professional services to recruit a pool of candidates for Executive Director. The RFP was published on the American Planning Association website, the SCOG website and in the Skagit Valley Herald newspaper. The RFQ was sent directly to six different recruiting firms. The consultant processes for both were competitive and consisted of consultant selection committees composed of SCOG board members, SCOG staff, and SCOG member agency staff scoring the written proposals. Selection committee members voted to conduct interviews and to select consultants based upon the proposal scoring. All scores were aggregated, and the highest-scoring consultants for each selection process were offered the opportunity to enter into contracts with SCOG. Contract negotiations were conducted in accordance with written SCOG policies.

In accordance with the Title VI Plan, a review of SCOG's Title VI Program is conducted periodically which includes an examination of consultant contracts. The review of consultants examines the use of Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) sub-contractors and the inclusion of Title VI requirements in consultant contracts.

SCOG evaluates all consultant contracts prior to execution to make sure that the appropriate Title VI language is included for compliance. SCOG inserts required contract language in all applicable agreements from the Title VI/Non-Discrimination Assurances as presented in the Title VI Plan.

SCOG continues to implement a procedure to further Title VI compliance in contracting. This procedure is to distribute a Title VI contractor compliance checklist to consultants before project closeout and to conduct administrative review of the checklist prior to distributing final payment under the contract.

As part of SCOG's Title VI education and training, SCOG invites consultants, contractors, and subcontractors to Washington State Department of Transportation Title VI trainings.

SCOG conducted reviews on all professional services agreements during the reporting period and ensured that all appropriate Title VI assurances were included. Title VI contractor compliance checklists were completed by contractors and reviewed and approved by SCOG for all professional services agreements that expired during the reporting period.

In the next review period, October 1, 2025–September 30, 2026, SCOG will conduct a major update of the Title VI Plan and will begin a major update of the Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan. SCOG will also complete an update of the ADA Self-Assessment and Program Access Plan, as well as updating the Skagit County Regional Demographic Profile. SCOG will also complete three major planning efforts of "Move Skagit" during the next reporting period: an update to the Regional Transportation Plan, a Regional Safety Action Plan, and a Regional Transportation Resiliency Improvement Plan. All three of these planning activities require a significant amount of public involvement and have associated Title VI and equity analysis activities as part of the planning processes. SCOG also plans on working with a consultant to refresh the organization's website, which will involve making sure that it is ADA compliant. Additional nondiscrimination activities include ongoing implementation of the SCOG Title VI Plan as well as activities to ensure continued compliance with the American with Disabilities Act, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 and other nondiscrimination requirements.

The United States Department of Transportation (USDOT) Standard Title VI/Non-Discrimination

Assurances DOT Order No. 1050.2A

The Skagit Council of Governments (herein referred to as the "Recipient"), **HEREBY AGREES THAT**, as a condition to receiving any Federal financial assistance from the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT), through Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT), is subject to and will comply with the following:

Statutory/Regulatory Authorities

- Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. § 2000d et seq., 78 stat. 252), (prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin);
- 49 C.F.R. Part 21 (entitled Non-discrimination In Federally-Assisted Programs Of The Department Of Transportation-Effectuation Of Title VI Of The Civil Rights Act Of 1964);
- 28 C.F.R. section 50.3 (U.S. Department of Justice Guidelines for Enforcement of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964);

The preceding statutory and regulatory cites hereinafter are referred to as the "Acts" and "Regulations," respectively.

General Assurances

In accordance with the Acts, the Regulations, and other pertinent directives, circulars, policy, memoranda, and/or guidance, the Recipient hereby gives assurance that it will promptly take any measures necessary to ensure that:

"No person in the United States shall, on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity, "for which the Recipient receives Federal financial assistance from DOT, including the Washington State Department of Transportation.

The Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987 clarified the original intent of Congress, with respect to Title VI and other Non-discrimination requirements (The Age Discrimination Act of 1975, and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973), by restoring the broad, institutional-wide scope and coverage of these non-discrimination statutes and requirements to include all programs and activities of the Recipient, so long as any portion of the program is Federally assisted.

Specific Assurances

More specifically, and without limiting the above general Assurance, the Recipient agrees with and gives the following Assurances with respect to its Federally assisted program:

1. The Recipient agrees that each "activity," "facility," or "program," as defined in §§ 21.23(b) and 21.23(e) of 49 C.F.R. § 21 will be (with regard to an "activity") facilitated, or will be (with regard

- to a "facility") operated, or will be (with regard to a "program") conducted in compliance with all requirements imposed by, or pursuant to the Acts and the Regulations.
- 2. The Recipient will insert the following notification in all solicitations for bids, Requests For Proposals for work, or material subject to the Acts and the Regulations made in connection with all Federal-Aid Highway Programs and, in adapted form, in all proposals for negotiated agreements regardless of funding source:

"The Skagit Council of Governments, in accordance with the provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (78 Stat. 252, 42 U.S.C. §§ 2000d to 2000d-4) and the Regulations, hereby notifies all bidders that it will affirmatively ensure that any contract entered into pursuant to this advertisement, disadvantaged business enterprises will be afforded full and fair opportunity to submit bids in response to this invitation and will not be discriminated against on the grounds of race, color, or national origin in consideration for an award."

- 3. The Recipient will insert the clauses of Appendix A and E of this Assurance in every contract or agreement subject to the Acts and the Regulations.
- 4. The Recipient will insert the clauses of Appendix B of this Assurance, as a covenant running with the land, in any deed from the United States effecting or recording a transfer of real property, structures, use, or improvements thereon or interest therein to a Recipient.
- 5. That where the Recipient receives Federal financial assistance to construct a facility, or part of a facility, the Assurance will extend to the entire facility and facilities operated in connection therewith.
- 6. That where the Recipient receives Federal financial assistance in the form, or for the acquisition of real property or an interest in real property, the Assurance will extend to rights to space on, over, or under such property.
- 7. That the Recipient will include the clauses set forth in Appendix C and Appendix D of this Assurance, as a covenant running with the land, in any future deeds, leases, licenses, permits, or similar instruments entered into by the Recipient with other parties:
 - a. for the subsequent transfer of real property acquired or improved under the applicable activity, project, or program; and
 - b. for the construction or use of, or access to, space on, over, or under real property acquired or improved under the applicable activity, project, or program.
- 8. That this Assurance obligates the Recipient for the period during which Federal financial assistance is extended to the program, except where the Federal financial assistance is to provide, or is in the form of, personal property, or real property, or interest therein, or structures or improvements thereon, in which case the Assurance obligates the Recipient, or any transferee for the longer of the following periods:

- a. the period during which the property is used for a purpose for which the Federal financial assistance is extended, or for another purpose involving the provision of similar services or benefits; or
- b. the period during which the Recipient retains ownership or possession of the property.
- 9. The Recipient will provide for such methods of administration for the program as are found by the Secretary of Transportation or the official to whom he/she delegates specific authority to give reasonable guarantee that it, other recipients, sub-recipients, sub-grantees, contractors, subcontractors, consultants, transferees, successors in interest, and other participants of Federal financial assistance under such program will comply with all requirements imposed or pursuant to the Acts, the Regulations, and this Assurance.
- 10. The Recipient agrees that the United States has a right to seek judicial enforcement with regard to any matter arising under the Acts, the Regulations, and this Assurance.

By signing this ASSURANCE, the Skagit Council of Governments also agrees to comply (and require any sub-recipients, sub-grantees, contractors, successors, transferees, and/or assignees to comply) with all applicable provisions governing the *Washington State Department of Transportation* access to records, accounts, documents, information, facilities, and staff. You also recognize that you must comply with any program or compliance reviews, and/or complaint investigations conducted by the *Washington State Department of Transportation*. You must keep records, reports, and submit the material for review upon request to *Washington State Department of Transportation*, or its designee in a timely, complete, and accurate way. Additionally, you must comply with all other reporting, data collection, and evaluation requirements, as prescribed by law or detailed in program guidance.

The Skagit Council of Governments gives this ASSURANCE in consideration of and for obtaining any Federal grants, loans, contracts, agreements, property, and/or discounts, or other Federal-aid and Federal financial assistance extended after the date hereof to the recipients by the U.S. Department of Transportation under the Federal Highway Administration. This ASSURANCE is binding on Washington State Department of Transportation, other recipients, sub-recipients, sub-grantees, contractors, subcontractors and their subcontractors', transferees, successors in interest, and any other participants in the Federal-Aid Highway Program. The person(s) signing below is authorized to sign this ASSURANCE on behalf of the Recipient.

APPENDIX A

During the performance of this contract, the contractor, for itself, its assignees, and successors in interest (hereinafter referred to as the "contractor") agrees as follows:

- Compliance with Regulations: The contractor (hereinafter includes consultants) will comply
 with the Acts and the Regulations relative to Non-discrimination in Federally-assisted programs
 of the U.S. Department of Transportation, Washington State Department of Transportation, as
 they may be amended from time to time, which are herein incorporated by reference and made
 a part of this contract.
- 2. **Non-discrimination**: The contractor, with regard to the work performed by it during the contract, will not discriminate on the grounds of race, color, or national origin in the selection and retention of subcontractors, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment. The contractor will not participate directly or indirectly in the discrimination prohibited by the Acts and the Regulations, including employment practices when the contract covers any activity, project, or program set forth in Appendix B of 49 CFR Part 21.
- 3. Solicitations for Subcontracts, Including Procurements of Materials and Equipment: In all solicitations, either by competitive bidding, or negotiation made by the contractor for work to be performed under a subcontract, including procurements of materials, or leases of equipment, each potential subcontractor or supplier will be notified by the contractor of the contractor's obligations under this contract and the Acts and the Regulations relative to Non-discrimination on the grounds of race, color, or national origin.
- 4. - 6. **Incorporation of Provisions**: The contractor will include the provisions of paragraphs one through six in every subcontract, including procurements of materials and leases of equipment,

The following clauses will be included in deeds effecting or recording the transfer of real property, structures, or improvements thereon, or granting interest therein from the United States pursuant to the provisions of Assurance 4:

NOW, THEREFORE, the U.S. Department of Transportation as authorized by law and upon the condition that the Skagit Council of Governments will accept title to the lands and maintain the project constructed thereon in accordance with Title 23, United States Code, the Regulations for the Administration of Washington State Department of Transportation, and the policies and procedures prescribed by the Federal Highway Administration of the U.S. Department of Transportation in accordance and in compliance with all requirements imposed by Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, U.S. Department of Transportation, Subtitle A, Office of the Secretary, Part 21, Non-discrimination in Federally-assisted programs of the U.S Department of Transportation pertaining to and effectuating the provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (78 Stat. 252; 42 U.S.C. § 2000d to 2000d-4), does hereby remise, release, quitclaim and convey unto the Skagit Council of Governments all the right, title and interest of the U.S. Department of Transportation in and to said lands described in Exhibit A attached hereto and made a part hereof.

(HABENDUM CLAUSE)

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD said lands and interests therein unto the Skagit Council of Governments and its successors forever, subject, however, to the covenants, conditions, restrictions and reservations herein contained as follows, which will remain in effect for the period during which the real property or structures are used for a purpose for which Federal financial assistance is extended or for another purpose involving the provision of similar services or benefits and will be binding on the Skagit Council of Governments, its successors and assigns.

The Skagit Council of Governments, in consideration of the conveyance of said lands and interests in lands, does hereby covenant and agree as a covenant running with the land for itself, its successors and assigns, that (1) no person will on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination with regard to any facility located wholly or in part on, over, or under such lands hereby conveyed [,] [and]* (2) that the Skagit Council of Governments will use the lands and interests in lands and interests in lands so conveyed, in compliance with all requirements imposed by or pursuant to Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, U.S. Department of Transportation, Subtitle A, Office of the Secretary, Part 21, Non-discrimination in Federally-assisted programs of the U.S. Department of Transportation, Effectuation of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and as said Regulations and Acts may be amended [, and (3) that in the event of breach of any of the above-mentioned non-discrimination conditions, the Department will have a right to enter or re-enter said lands and facilities on said land, and that above described land and facilities will thereon revert to and vest in and become the absolute property of the U.S. Department of Transportation and its assigns as such interest existed prior to this instruction].*

The (grantee, lessee, permittee, etc. as appropriate) for himself/herself, his/her heirs, personal representatives, successors in interest, and assigns, as a part of the consideration hereof, does hereby covenant and agree [in the case of deeds and leases add "as a covenant running with the land"] that:
 - 1. In the event facilities are constructed, maintained, or otherwise operated on the property described in this (deed, license, lease, permit, etc.) for a purpose for which a U.S. Department of Transportation activity, facility, or program is extended or for another purpose involving the provision of similar services or benefits, the (grantee, licensee, lessee, permittee, etc.) will maintain and operate such facilities and services in compliance with all requirements imposed by the Acts and Regulations (as may be amended) such that no person on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, will be excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the use of said facilities.
- B. With respect to licenses, leases, permits, etc., in the event of breach of any of the above Non-discrimination covenants, the Skagit Council of Governments will have the right to terminate the (lease, license, permit, etc.) and to enter, re-enter, and repossess said lands and facilities thereon, and hold the same as if the (lease, license, permit, etc.) had never been made or issued.*
- C. With respect to a deed, in the event of breach of any of the above Non-discrimination covenants, the Skagit Council of Governments will have the right to enter or re-enter the lands and facilities thereon, and the above described lands and facilities will there upon revert to and vest in and become the absolute property of the Skagit Council of Governments and its assigns.*

The (grantee, licensee, permittee, etc., as appropriate) for himself/herself, his/her heirs, personal representatives, successors in interest, and assigns, as a part of the consideration hereof, does hereby covenant and agree (in the case of deeds and leases add, "as a covenant running with the land") that (1) no person on the ground of race, color, or national origin, will be excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination in the use of said facilities, (2) that in the construction of any improvements on, over, or under such land, and the furnishing of services thereon, no person on the ground of race, color, or national origin, will be excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or otherwise be subjected to discrimination, (3) that the (grantee, licensee, lessee, permittee, etc.) will use the premises in compliance with all other requirements imposed by or pursuant to the Acts and Regulations, as amended, set forth in this Assurance.
- B. With respect to (licenses, leases, permits, etc.), in the event of breach of any of the above Non-discrimination covenants, the Skagit Council of Governments will have the right to terminate the (license, permit, etc., as appropriate) and to enter or re-enter and repossess said land and the facilities thereon, and hold the same as if said (license, permit, etc., as appropriate) had never been made or issued.*
- C. With respect to deeds, in the event of breach of any of the above Non-discrimination covenants, the Skagit Council of Governments will there upon revert to and vest in and become the absolute property of the Skagit Council of Governments and its assigns.*
